

Firm Roots Cancer Support Group at Idle Baptist Church A little about ourselves

Our group is open to anyone who has been affected in some way by cancer. You may have cancer yourself and be undergoing treatment, you may be in remission or on the mend. Some of our people are or have been caring for a loved one with cancer, they too have valued the support they have received in the group.

We are a small friendly group. The numbers who come each month vary depending on circumstances. But there are usually 6-8 people. The group is open to anyone, people of faith, or no faith, you don't have to be a Christian to come.

When we arrive, we greet one another over tea coffee and cake and introduce new members. Some of us might not have seen each other for a month so there is a lot of catching up to do!

This part of the meeting is really important for us, it is a time to share what has been happening, their hopes and fears, with people who understand. During this time tears are sometimes shed – that's ok, we all understand – but there is also much laughter, both are equally important.

After we have had our refreshments and catch up, we think about things that are important to us. Where we find hope or comfort, feeling fearful, finding peace and encouragement. We look at some simple verses from the bible and see how they might help us.

We pray for one another and others we know who are going through struggles. We say a short, written prayer together before we leave.

At 12 midday lunch is served at the church for anyone who would like to stay and talk for longer.

Supporting one another is very important to us. we have a prayer sheet that can be used till we meet again and first names or initials only are used to respect confidentiality.

Confidentiality is emphasised at the beginning of each meeting.

Abide with me: fast falls the eventide;

The words of 'Abide with Me' were written by Scottish minister and poet, Henry Francis Lyte in 1847. Lyte probably wrote the hymn just after conducting his final church service in September 1847; Lyte at the time was suffering from tuberculosis, an infection he would die of two months later. Lyte's inspiration for the hymn probably came in 1820 after visiting his sick friend, William Augustus Le Hunte. As his friend lay on his deathbed, he repeatedly said the phrase, 'Abide with Me'.

Lyte was born in Scotland in 1793 and trained for the Anglican ministry in Dublin. He served in several parishes before moving to Lower Brixham, a small fishing village in Devon where he served for 24 years.

The first verse is a prayer for God's abiding care when friends fail.

1 Abide with me: fast falls the eventide; the darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide. When other helpers fail and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

In the first two verses of Psalm 61 we read:

Hear my cry, O God;
Iisten to my prayer.
From the ends of the earth I call to you,
I call as my heart grows faint;
Iead me to the rock that is higher than I.

In Luke 24 we read about how the resurrected Jesus appeared to two of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. We read in the King James version:

Although the words above were the initial inspiration for the first verse, 'Abide with me' is not an evening hymn.

'Evening' is being used as a metaphor for the close of life, a transition from life's 'little day'.

²⁸ And they drew nigh unto the village, whither they went: and he made as though he would have gone further.

²⁹ But they constrained him, saying, Abide with us: for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent. And he went in to tarry with them.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day;
 earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away.
 Change and decay in all around I see.
 O thou who changest not, abide with me.

Our unchanging God still cares for us when everything seems to change and decay.

In the first chapter of James we read:

¹⁷ Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

Psalm 102 verses 26 and 27 say:

They will perish, but you remain;
they will all wear out like a garment.
Like clothing you will change them
and they will be discarded.
But you remain the same,
and your years will never end.

3. I need thy presence every passing hour. What but thy grace can foil the tempter's power? Who like thyself my guide and strength can be? Through cloud and sunshine, O abide with me.

The Lord will protect us when the devil attacks.

In Romans 16 v 20 we read:

The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet. The grace of our Lord Jesus be with you.

Psalm 61 v 3 & 4 say:

For you have been my refuge,
a strong tower against the foe.
I long to dwell in your tent for ever
and take refuge in the shelter of your wings.

4. I fear no foe with thee at hand to bless,ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness.Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory?I triumph still, if thou abide with me.

The Lord will be with us when death approaches.

We find these reassuring words in Psalm 27 v 1

The LORD is my light and my salvation—
whom shall I fear?
The LORD is the stronghold of my life—
of whom shall I be afraid?

Also Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 15 v 55

"Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"

> 5. Hold thou thy cross before my closing eyes. Shine through the gloom and point me to the skies. Heaven's morning breaks and earth's vain shadows flee; in life, in death, O Lord, abide with me.

The Lord will carry us from this life to Heaven's glory.

Paul wrote to the Corinthians:

Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

(2 Corinthians 4 v 16 – 18)

In the 21st chapter of Revelation John describes his vision of the New Jerusalem which

"....has no need of the sun or the moon because the glory of God shines on it," (verse 23).

'Abide with me' has three additional verses which do not appear in hymn books.

Not a brief glance I beg, a passing word, But as Thou dwell'st with Thy disciples, Lord, Familiar, condescending, patient, free. Come not to sojourn, but abide with me.

Come not in terror, as the King of kings, But kind and good, with healing in Thy wings; Tears for all woes, a heart for every plea. Come, Friend of sinners, thus abide with me.

Thou on my head in early youth didst smile, And though rebellious and perverse meanwhile, Thou hast not left me, oft as I left Thee. On to the close, O Lord, abide with me.

'Abide with me' is very popular, often sung at funerals and other events.

For example, it was sung at the funeral of King George V and at the wedding of his granddaughter, Queen Elizabeth II.

Lyte wrote a considerable body of poetry, hymns, and psalm paraphrases.

His other well-known hymn is 'Praise my soul the King of Heaven.'

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Bright Side


Laugh more, worry less,
